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Not "AIM", now it's "AEM"

- What is AEM?
 - ${\sf Accessible} \ \textbf{Educational} \ {\sf Materials}$
 - Accessibility refers to providing access for all people, including people with disabilities, to educational materials.

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What are the Requirements
Under the Law?

- Copyright Law (1931) Library of Congress
- Chafee Amendment (1996) to Copyright Law
- IDEA 2004
 - 300.172 Access to Instructional Materials
 - 300.210 Purchase of Instructional Materials
- Oregon Administrative Rules
 - **581-011-0052** Accessible Instructional Materials Required
 - **581-015-2060** Accessible Materials
 - **581-022-1640** Instructional Materials Adoption
 - **581-022-1622** Independent Adoptions of Instructional Materials

Accessible Educational Materials are:

- Print educational materials used in instruction to help students meet curricular and/or IEP goals.
- Materials provided in accessible format.
- To be provided to students with print disabilities who need them.

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What are Accessible Formats?

• Braille



• Large Print

• Audio



Large **Print**

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- To be provided to students with print disabilities who need them.

What are Print Disabilities

- Blindness
- Visual Disability
- Physical limitation
- Reading Disability due to organic dysfunction

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Legal requirement

- OAR 591-015-2060
- ...School districts must ensure the timely provision of instructional materials in accessible formats to children who need instructional materials in accessible formats, including those who are not blind or print disabled.

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Does a Student "NEED" Accessible Educational Materials?

- Students with a variety of disabilities may need AEM because they understand the content, but are unable to read or access the print materials in the standard format.
- Not all students with IEP or 504 plans will need AEM.
- \bullet All students with IEP or 504 plans who do need AEM must receive it.

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Acquiring AEM

- A student's identified needs, based on his/her disability, will determine where accessible Educational materials can be obtained.
- Not all students are eligible to access materials from all resources due to copyright protection.

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AEM Navigator CAST

Guides the team through four major decision points:

- 1) determination of need,
- 2) selection of format(s),
- 3) acquisition of format(s), and
- 4) selection of supports for use.
